ANNUAL REPORT

GENTLEMEN,

The Club suffered a grievous loss in the death of Evan Hunter on 31st January, 1954. Evan was Honorary Secretary of the Club from 1923–1948. Not only did successive generations of Oxford and Cambridge athletes come under his wise direction, but he became their personal friend. The affairs of the Club were always organised in that meticulous way characteristic of Evan, and the Club during his time of office reached its zenith. A Memorial Service to Evan Hunter was held on 17th February, attended by the officers and many members, and the Address, given by the Rt. Rev. C. M. Chavasse The Lord Bishop of Rochester on that occasion, is included as an insertion to this Report.

As will be seen, the Report has returned to its more abbreviated form, excluding the list of names and addresses of members. These will, however, be included in the larger style Report for 1956. The response to the suggestion that members might like to contribute something towards the printing costs was most generous and encouraging, and our thanks are due to all those who sent contributions. In addition, it resulted in addresses being supplied for eight "Gone away" members, and amendments to details of a further forty-four.

The Club is passing through a difficult period, particularly as regards team competitions, and the Hon. Team Manager reports elsewhere on these and other matters. Members nevertheless continued to set up first-class performances and three more names may now be added to the list of twenty-three who have broken World Records—namely, C. J. Chataway and R. G. Bannister in the 4×1 mile Relay, and D. C. Law in the 4×1,500 m. Relay. In addition, Bannister broke the British All-Comers' Record in the Mile in 4 min. 03·6 sec. In a disallowed run at Motspur Park, Bannister achieved 4 min. 2·0 sec., passing the 1,500 m. mark in 3 min. 44·8 sec., the best time ever accomplished by an Englishman. C. J. Chataway also achieved a British All-Comers' Record in the 2 Miles, beating Gordon Pirie in 8 min. 49·6 sec.

Apart from the American tour, it was found impossible to arrange other tours abroad. Nine members did, however, represent Great Britain at the International Student Games at Dortmund, 9th–16th August, D. C. Law winning the 1,500 m. The Team Manager reports as follows:-

The season of 1953, from a team point of view, was a nadir in the 33 years' history of the Club. The tribulations of raising a team cligible (under the maze of First-Claim restrictions) to represent us in "Open Competition" were great, but the departure of the 8th Touring

Team to U.S.A., taking with it much of our front line strength, put paid to any chances of making even a reasonable showing at the Annual Kinnaird Trophy, of which we have so often been the holders in the past.

Strong efforts were made to raise a full team for the Sward Trophy in which we came second. We would have won but for a steeplechaser who?" withheld his labour" along with other Competitors because the organisers were disinclined to switch the distance of the event from 2 miles to the now fashionable 3,000 metres distance.

It was not possible to find either four sprinters or four quartermilers eligible for the A.A.A. Championship Relays staged at Cardiff, but a team of nine First-Claim members performed very successfully and enjoyably at the Ryder Trophy meeting at Southampton.

It'will be seen that the Club is in a precarious position regarding its Team Matches, due to the effect of the First-Claim Rule, whereby about 40% of active members cannot represent the Club in open Team Matches. Considerable thought has been given to the problem by the Committee.

In January application was made by C. J. Chataway to the First-Claim Sub-Committee of the Southern Committee, to become First-Claim Achilles during 1953, and to revert First Claim to Walton A.C. on going down from Oxford. This application was refused,

On 7th February, the Club submitted the following alteration in Rules to the A.A.A. General Committee.

"A First-Claim member of a Club, who is a student at a University shall, on making application to the A.A.A., and provided such application has the support of his First-Claim Clúb, be eligible to represent his University Athletic Club or any Club whose membership is restricted to University athletes, as first-claim so long as he is a student at the University. Such First-Claim membership shall cease on September 30th in the year in which the athlete leaves the University."

The Committee were, therefore, compelled reluctantly to recommend the policy as set out in the following resolution.

"The Committee of the Achilles Club believe that it is in the interest of athletics that athletes while they are in residence at Oxford and Cambridge should be able, if they so wish, to represent the Achilles Club without restriction; and that, in particular, any undergraduate who is a First-Claim member of another Club, should be able to represent the Achilles Club as first claim on election without any waiting-period, and for as long as he is in residence.

"Accordingly, the Committee will urge any athlete who is already a member of another Club, and who is offered membership of the Achilles Club, to resign from his First-Claim Club, on being elected to the Achilles Club; and at the same time the Committee intend again to use every endeavour to secure the necessary alteration to the A.A.A. Rules so that this exception to the First-Claim rule may be available to athletes while they are in residence at the Universities."
